





## Building a better future for women

Few women choose to work in construction, yet the industry still needs to recruit and retain 74,000 new people each year, for the next five years, and can no longer ignore such a key sector of the workforce. With this in mind, the University of Central Lancashire in Preston is opening its doors to a group of young women who may be the designers, engineers, roofers and joiners of the future.

In a joint initiative with the Construction Industry Training Board (CITB) and the Construction Curriculum Centre at Preston College, a group of 30 female pupils from local schools will be spending five days at the University, learning some of the tricks of the trade. A full programme of activities will be laid on, with projects including the construction of a 'tetrahedral cathedral' out of garden canes, elastic bands and card; communication and leadership exercises taking place at the Preston Sports Arena; visits to construction sites: and laboratory based work in the University's Department of Built Environment. At the end of the week, the pupils will be giving a series of short presentations detailing their week's activities and each of them will receive a certificate of attendance.

Throughout the week, the pupils will be given the opportunity to learn about the career opportunities available for them within the industry.

Dr Andrew Platten, Head of Department of Built Environment says: "The construction industry currently needs a high number of well qualified managers and engineers to meet both its current and future needs. The industry requires both female and male degree graduates. This programme offers a unique insight into the industry for school pupils. It builds on a number of similar events and seeks to introduce some of the essential team working skills for these students."
